- Sabbath October 5, 2013 Pray for pastors and their families (for spiritual, emotional, physical protection and ever-increasing commitment to Jesus and His mission)
- Sanuary 8-18, 2014 Ten Days of Prayer

Departmental write up – an article that gives us insight into our departments...

CHILDREN ... leading the church into the future.

When we talk about the importance of Children's Ministries in the church, we often say children are the future but, in reality, we cannot imagine them playing a significant role whilst they are still classified as children. Both our study of the Bible and statements on children by Ellen G. White should convince us that children are very special to God and He sees them as formidable soldiers in His army.

"In the closing scenes of earth's history, many of these children and youth will astonish people by their witness to the truth, which will be borne in simplicity, yet with spirit and power. They have been taught the fear of the Lord, and their hearts have been softened by a careful and prayerful study of the Bible. In the near future, many children will be endued with the Spirit of God, and will do a work in proclaiming the truth to the world, that at that time cannot well be done by the older members of the church." Counsels to Teachers and Parents, pp. 166,167.

Our mission as Dube Children's Ministries is very much aligned with that of the General Conference; "to nurture children into a loving relationship with Jesus". In our plans to develop the faith of children (up to the age of 14), we focus on the following:

- *Teaching them about God*
- Encouraging parents and guardians to play an active role in leading their children to Christ
- *Providing platforms for children to evangelise*
- Training children in singing and in understanding music as a form of worship

Highlights during the first quarter of the year have included bi-monthly church services with profound yet practical sermons preached by members of the youth, alternating with captivating Children's stories in the main church during divine service.

The afternoons have also found the children spoilt for choice in terms of activities. Making allowance for progressive classes run by the Pathfinders' Department every second week, Children's Ministries designs programs every alternate afternoon featuring Bible study, musical training and Arts & Crafts. The Arts & Crafts not only equip the children with useful skills such as knitting and sewing, but also provide the department with beautiful products such as heart-shaped cushions which will be used for outreach purposes.







In an effort to keep the broader church abreast of developments in Children's ministries, a children's notice board has been erected in the church's foyer. The content changes regularly, allowing for the theme of the month to be highlighted, for different children to be profiled, for upcoming events to be announced and for children's testimonies to be shared. The children themselves are encouraged to take ownership of the notice board. Under adult supervision, the team conducts interviews with peers and compiles relevant content for the notice board.

As stated in the Children's Ministries manual, "It is vital that we take children seriously as the heritage of the Lord, entrusted to us for training and discipling that they will lead the church into the future." We encourage every member of the church to join hands with us and participate in moulding these young minds to become faithful followers of Christ. It is indeed a privilege.

Where & when were you born?

Where did you work?

I started working as a model at Khuphukani, the I moved on to work at OK as a general worker and then again to Malbhack as a general worker, this is where I was soon promoted to supervisor. I was good at my job and it showed hence the promotion from a general worker to a supervisor.

Were you born in Seventh Day Adventist church?

I got introduced to the faith in my youth, my father and my father's side of the family was already Seventh Day Adventists, but because I stayed with my mother I didn't know about the church until later in life. This was when my father insisted that I attend Bethel University. When I joined the church, I immediately loved the style of worship, the singing, the sense of dress and the manner in which the young men respected their elders.

How did being in the church impact your spiritual life?

I admit though that when I joined the church I was more attracted to the things they did and how they looked more than I was with getting saved! In time, I grew in Christ, understood the word and gave my life to Christ.



What made you stay in the church up until now?

When I finally gave my life to Christ my life changed for the better. My personality changed, I made good friends that were a big part of my becoming a better person!

What is your favourite hymnal?

My favorite hymnal is number 38; the words of this song have helped me stand strong even when things weren't so great.

Easy Healthy Recipes

Lentil Lasagne

Ingredients

Lasagne sheets 350g; lentils boiled (drain any excess water); 2 tins tomato puree; 4 large tomatoes grated 3 onions; Olive oil –optional; Herbs- oregano, sweet basil or general mixed herb; 2 teaspoons sugar/fructose; Vegetable stock/ Inapaarmans lemon & herb seasoning; Salt- use your own discretion; Garlic- use your own discretion

Instructions

Use the olive oil to fry the onions or you can just cook the onions together with the tomatoes without adding anything until visibly cooked. Once cooked add the 2 cans of tomatoes puree, add your all your seasonings using your own discretion until you get the right flavour. Follow the instructions on the lasagne sheets box to prepare the sheets. For the first layer just spread the lentils on the oven pan or casserole dish. Layer the lasagne sheets & then the lentils again. Keep repeating the steps until the top. You can use the cheese sauce or the white sauce as a topping.

Bran Muffins

Ingredients

Bran Muffins Brown bread flour 6 cups;Sugar/fructose 2.5cups (you can make it 2 cups only) Grated fresh ginger; 2 teaspoons salt; 6 teaspoon baking powder; 2/3 cup olive oil (canola or normal oil also work); 2 teaspoon soy lecthin (you can do without it); 2 cups soy milk (add more according to your own discretion)

Instructions

Mix all the ingredients and spoon into the muffin pan & bake at 180C till golden brown.

*For a variety add charob powder using your own discretion, add charob chunks too. For banana flavoured muffins add 6 large ripe mashed bananas.
